IU 13 PIIC Mentor Kelly Galbraith and IU 8 PIIC Mentor Diane Hubona closed the day with *Skill s, Semantics, and Strategies: The Pathway to Common Core Writing*

, a general session designed to give participants an understanding of the Common Core writing standards. At the end of the general session, coaches and other participants were asked to reflect upon their newly-acquired strategies and to plan how the strategies will be used with teachers to improve classroom instruction.

Day 2 started with an informative panel discussion sharing the thoughts of Penn Delco School

District (SD) instructional coach Tara Young; Bellwood-Antis SD instructional coach/IU 8 PIIC Mentor Diane Hubona; Bradford Area SD instructional coach Karen Macartney; and IU 4 PIIC Mentor Amy Walker. Panelists discussed ways coaches can engage teachers, shared their coaching experiences, and answered questions from the audience.
